#### PREFACE

The Christmas number of Good Words, 1896, has an article on "Notable Dogs of the Chase: the Irish Wolfhound. Illustrated by R.H. Moore."

The writer, who signs himself "St. Bernard," says: What manner of beast this giant of his race was no one knows, and there is now nothing to assure us, except that he was used for the destruction of wolves."

In the Dublin Evening Telegraph of December 12, under the name of "Swaran," I quoted more than twenty instances in which "St. Bernard" showed want of respect for accuracy of statement or the requirements of logic. I now proceed to tell what kind of hound this mighty and mysterious creature was.

The subject seems to have a great attraction for Englishmen, as is evidenced by the establishment in Britain of the Irish Wolfhound Club, and by the space devoted to Irish wolfhounds in the works on dogs which are continually issuing from the press. These books are written with such enthusiasm, and are read with such avidity, that "they go off like hot cakes," if I may be allowed a familiar expression. This interest in the subject is quite natural, for, as Byron sings:-

"The poor dog is in life the firmest friend,

The first to welcome, foremost to defend,

Whose honest heart is still his master's own,

Who labours, fights, lives, breathes for him alone."



The foxhound, the old Irish Wolfdog and the Colly may perhaps be considered as possessing the greatest purity of blood"

"Lord Cadogan was considered to have had the last of the true otterhound given him by Sir W Scott and yet look at the grand dog of this breed we now have!

Page 324. Mastiff. this noble dog, which like the bulldog, is supposed to be an original breed peculiar to this country is now seldom to be not with in its pure state – it having been crossed and recrossed






